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EARLY DX

This month's column is a contribution from K9FN in West Lafayette. At a North West Indiana DX Club meeting in August, David mentioned DXing on 15m as a Novice during the peak of Solar Cycle 19 (the biggest one in our recorded history). I thought this would be an interesting story, so here it is. Carl K9LA

Anyone who knows me realizes that I love to tell stories about some of my earlier days chasing DX. I often share the excitement of working BS7H on 30 meters, in broad daylight, while running 50 watts from my mobile as I headed back to my office following a Doctor's appointment.

However, some of the most exciting moments ever were in the first few months as a Novice (KN9LIH), when I ran a DX-40 and S-85 with just a single crys-

tal that allowed me to get on 15 meters. It was 1957 and the band was alive for many hours every day. I still remember the first CQ I called (at about 7 WPM). I called for about 2 minutes and then began to slowly tune for an answer. I heard my call, followed by "... de KN6MHO". I was so excited I jumped out of my chair, but my foot was tangled in a cord under the desk and I jerked the AC cord feeding my receiver. I dove under the table, found the cord and plugged it in again. As my receiver came back to life, drifting as it always did, I heard the guy finish calling me. I went back to him and we completed my first DX QSO. When you live in Illinois, and

California is your first QSO, it sure is DX... country #1. At that time, I had not learned what DX was nor what it meant.

As time moved forward I proceeded to work anyone who would answer my CQ, or who could find me as I answered their CQ. My antenna was a single loop, the driven element of a Quad, and it performed quite well. When the person at the carpet store, where you could buy long bamboo poles for \$.50 each, heard why I wanted 4 of them, he helped me pick out good straight ones that appeared to be quite strong, and then just gave them to me.

One evening at about 11:30 PM I called CQ and up the band I heard OK3KGI calling me. We completed our QSO and I ran into the other room to tell my father that I had just worked another country. He asked which one. I told him I was not sure, but the prefix was "OK", and I knew that Peru was "OA" so I figured that I must have just worked something in South America. I went back to the shack and looked up OK and was then REALLY stoked, since that was way over there in Europe.

By the time I upgraded to General I had put 34 different countries into my log, and I had also learned that there was an award called DXCC, which I could earn by confirming 100 countries. I hoped that someday I could achieve that goal.

Now, with 363 confirmed and an Honor Roll #1 plaque, I still love the thrill of DX. But few QSOs can match the excitement of those earliest ones.

SKYWARN NET CONTINUES TO SEEK LEADERS

The Allen County SKWYARN net continues to seek volunteers who are willing to take on the leadership position of net control station operator.

For those hams who might be new to the concept, a net (short for network) is a gathering of ham radio stations on a predetermined frequency. It's analogous to a business conference call, some of which have moderators who lead the call and determine who can speak and when. Ham radio nets also have such moderators. We call them, "net control stations" (NCS).

The more NCS volunteers a SKYWARN

net has, the more likely one of them will be available during a severe weather event. The Allen County SKYWARN net has a team of excellent NCS operators, but unfortunately, there are still times when no member of that team is available. That's why the net hope to add more hams to the NCS team.

To be an NCS, you need to have completed in-person SKYWARN spotter training within the past three years (within the past year preferred) and have a reliable signal on the Fort Wayne 146.88 MHz (primary) and 146.76 MHz (secondary) repeaters. Familiarity with SKYWARN net procedures, which can be gained by downloading and reading the net's operation manual, is important. Optional and helpful (*but not required*) are:

- Internet access, for relaying reports to the NWS when WX9IWX is not on the air (NWS provides validated NCS operators access to an internal chat room).
- Experience as an NCS of any other net, including ARES, IMO traffic net, etc.
- A 70 cm radio, because NCS operators sometimes use UHF to coordinate shift changes, etc. without tying up the VHF frequency.

THE FOXHUNT CHRONICLES FOR THE AUGUST HUNT

The August foxhunt started promptly at 1:30 pm, on 5 August on a typical Indiana summer's day. A little on the warm side but with a gentle breeze blowing.

On the hunting side of the equation for this event were the team consisting of Jim Pliett, K9OMA, Annie Pliett, KA9YYI, Carole Burke, WB9RUS and Al Burke, WB9SSE, the team of Steve & Linda Nardin, W9's SAN & LAN and their grandson Alex, and the team of Charles Ward, KC9MUT, Fred Gengnagel, KC9EZP and Stuart Hall, KD9LFW.

Don Glick, K9LI and his wife Julie served as the fox. They choose Payton Park, north-west of the city, as their hiding spot. Don used a yagi driven by a mobile rig, aimed towards the Corbin Memorial Park starting point to serve as the high-power fox used to taunt the hunters. He and Julie hid the microfox (a microprocessor based cw transmitter with about a 15-mw output) within the top rafters, just beneath the roof, of the covered pavilion at the Peyton Park site. It turned out to be difficult to spot.

Our team heard the high-power fox starting with its first transmission, and it gave us an initial bearing to the northnorthwest. So, we headed up Coliseum from the Corbin Park starting point until we got up around IPFW at which point



the DF bearings suggested we head due north.

We wound up following the DF bearings until they indicated the fox was north of Hathaway Rd. somewhere off Dunton Rd. At that point we realized that the fox most likely was located in Payton Park, a small, little known facility, part of the Allen County Parks system. (We were aware of its existence because we had used Payton Park in the past for a few Field Day venues).

Once we turned north on Dunton Rd. off Hathaway we picked up the microfox signal. That told us that the microfox had to be somewhat elevated, and had to have its antenna installed, or else we wouldn't have heard it. We gave silent gratitude to Don and Julie for not following the evil practices followed by the Ward and Nar-



din teams who typically:

- 1. Remove the microfox antenna, or
- 2. Bury the microfox in a tree or plant it underground, or
- 3. Encase the microfox in a metallic casing that an EMP pulse would have a hard time escaping.
- 4. Sometimes they use all three practices noted above.

So, our team was first on the scene and the first to localize Don, Julie and the fox. Soon after we arrived at Payton Park we were on foot, Jim with his two-meter handheld yagi antenna and receiver, and I with my handheld yagi and receiver tuned to the third harmonic of the microfox. These systems quickly told us that the microfox was located somewhere in or around the pavilion. And thus, we started searching.

Eventually Charles and team arrived on site and also started searching on foot.
