

An Antenna for 75m and 80m

enjoy checking into QIN (the Indiana CW traffic net) down on 3555 KHz. Due to summer activities, I mostly check in during the winter months. I also enjoy chasing

I NOA

DX in the CW portion of 80m (3500 to 3550 KHz) and in the Phone portion of 75m (3750 to 3800 KHz).

Having one antenna to cover 75m and 80m is always a problem due to the large fractional bandwidth (percent bandwidth equals the highest frequency minus the lowest frequency divided by the center frequency, then times 100). In the past I've cut my antenna for 3775 KHz, and added wire extensions (with alligator clip leads) when I wanted to operate in the CW portion. But that gets old, especially on a dark night in winter with lots of snow on the ground.

One way to cover both of those ranges is to utilize the concept of a trap antenna.


Normally a trap antenna covers two different bands. But there's no reason why a trap antenna couldn't be built for 75m and 80m since the two ranges are quite far apart.


I had a set of 80m traps from an old 160m/80m inverted-vee. Using these

traps, I put up an inverted-vee with the traps. See the accompanying sketch of this antenna. I cut the inner length for 3750 KHz with the traps hooked up. I then added more wire after the traps to resonate the system at 3550 KHz. The resulting SWR is per the accompanying figure (in the shack after about 150 feet of RG-8 coax).

Note that the system resonates as expected at two frequencies – in the Phone portion and in the CW portion. The bad news is the SWR gets high in between (around 3600 KHz) – but that's okay for me since I don't plan to operate around this high SWR area.

The 2:1 SWR bandwidth of this antenna is 3505-3565 KHz (60 KHz) and 3670-3805 KHz (135 KHz). My 3CX800 amplifier





output matching network has no problem loading without arcing into a 2:1 SWR. The traps I used are made by W2AU, and are rated for 2 kW. They've handled the output power of the amplifier with no problem.

So I'm happy. Now I can enjoy both 75m and 80m without running outside with a flashlight in the cold dark night.

NWS Announces New Plans for SKYWARN Storm Spotter Training

The northern Indiana office of the National Weather Service (NWS) to-day announced new plans for volunteer storm spotter training as part of the NWS SKYWARN program.

The NWS office plans seven regional, multi-county spotter training sessions in 2014 (see the region map below). An NWS meteorologist will lead each regional session in person, rather than remotely via teleconference. The session for the region that includes Allen County, Indiana is scheduled to take place at Columbia City High School, 600 N. Whitley St., Columbia City, Ind. That session is scheduled for Feb. 18, beginning at 7 p.m. EST. The NWS will not conduct SKYWARN training in Allen County, Indiana in 2014 -- not even the remotely-presented training the NWS provided in 2013.

Spotters and people interested in be-

coming spotters may attend any of the regional spotter training sessions listed on the NWS event calendar (http://www. crh.noaa.gov/iwx/program areas/outreach/index.php). It is not necessary to attend the session designated for your county. For example, residents of southern Allen County might prefer to attend the training that's scheduled in Bluffton, Ind. Regardless of which session you plan to attend, NWS requests that you register in advance, using the appropriate link on the NWS event calendar. Registration is not required but the NWS encourages registration to help it assure that it has sufficient facilities, etc. for the number of people who attend.

For those unable to attend any of the regional spotter training sessions in 2014, the NWS plans multiple other training opportunities. For more information, please see an email message below from Michael Lewis, the warning coordination meteorologist at the northern Indiana

THE FOXHUNT CHRONICLES

Sunday, October 6, 2013. The sun sorta came up, the birds stay in bed, and the skies opened up with rain, rain, rain. But non-the-less, a stalwart crew of foxhunters assembled in the Off-Track Betting Parlor at Lima and Washington Center roads for the October foxhunt. This enthusiastic (if damp) crew consisted of the team of Linda and Steve Nardin, W9's LAN and SAN, the team of Annie and Jim Pliett, KA9YYI and K9OMA plus Carole and Al Burke, WB9's RUS and SSE, and single hunter Robert Dean, KC9UHU.

While the foxhunters were contemplating the wet slogging ahead, the foxes, Charles Ward, KC9MUT and Fred Gengnagel, KC9EZP, luxuriated under a nice, dry, warm tent fly out in the piney-woods of Matea Park near Cedar Creek off Hursh Rd. (A photo of this bourgeoisie encampment taken surreptitiously by an RPV cleverly engaged by the Pliett-Burke team is possibly included in the Ham news version of this article, or on the club web page). During the fly-by the RPV's microphone picked up audio, reportedly from Charles, stating "We doon need no stinking umbrellas,....hee, hee, hee". They were utilizing a yagi fed by about 150 watts for the high power signal, and a camouflaged microfox radiating about 150 miliwatts of cw, and cleverly secreted in a tree, as the actual fox.

Promptly at 13:30 the fox began squawking on the 146.76 machines input. The initial bearings indicated east, so off everybody went. Initially we spotted Steve and Linda in trail, but eventually everyone got separated, and we didn't see anybody again until we localized the fox.

For this hunt, Jim installed a four antenna Doppler-DF system on the van's roof in addition to the roof mounted yagi. This additional technology was a response to



the Pickle-Fork direction of arrival system that Charles and Fred had utilized during the September hunt. Our analysis of the ABM treaty revealed that the Pickle-Fork system was, in fact, allowable. Thus, we countered with the Doppler system. However, we found that in general the Doppler system readings were unreliable. Perhaps some tweaking is in order, or perhaps Charles and Fred were doing something hinky with their antennas, you just never know about those guys.

We sort-of localized the fox near Cedar Creek just off Hursh Rd. on the grounds of Matea Park. We meet Robert, KC9UHU in a small parking lot, part of the Park complex, and received a very strong signal from the microfox. So we started hiking down one of the Park trails, tracking the microfox's signals.

Now, it was raining, I mean REALLY raining as we slogged through the undergrowth. It got so bad I ran across an obviously nervous frog carrying an aqualung. I mean, Jim and I were just soaked, and we were wearing rain-gear.

Finally we reached Cedar Creek and determined that the fox had to be across the creek. At that point, Charles and Fred's life expectancy would have been nil had we found them alone.

So we walked back out of the forest, and got even wetter, crossed the creek by tromping about a half-mile down Hursh Rd., got even wetter, and re-entered the forest. Then we marched about another mile through the undergrowth, got off the trail, and got even wetter yet, until we started hearing the fox third harmonic. (By the way, in this process we also ran across Jimmy Hoffa and Ho-Chi-Min, and they were wet and honked-off too). We were so wet, my cell phone quit working, and I met a guy by the name of Noah who said "screw this, I'm moving to Saudi Arabia."

Jim and I knew that the micro-fox was in a large downed tree, but it took us


Based upon time and mileage readings, the scores for this month's contest and year-to-date cumulative points are as listed in the table at the bottom of the previous page.

IARU REGION 2 PUBLISHES NEW BAND PLAN

From the ARRL News

International Amateur Radio Union (IARU) Region 2 (the Americas) has published a revised IARU Region 2 Band Plan for all allocations from 137 kHz to 250 GHz, effective September 27, 2013. The member-societies of IARU Region 2 adopted the new plan during their triennial General Assembly in Cancun, Mexico, in late September. Delegates from 18 national Amateur Radio associations attended. Representing the ARRL were President Kay Craigie, N3KN, as the voting delegate; First Vice President Rick Roderick, K5UR; Chief Executive Officer David Sumner, K1ZZ, and Technical Relations Specialist Jonathan Siverling, WB3ERA.

"For the first time in Region 2, band plans for the VHF, UHF, and microwave bands were adopted to guide development of these bands," Sumner said. "HF band plans were reviewed with the objective of improving terminology and aligning them more closely with those of

the other regions, particularly Region 1 (Europe, Africa, the Middle East, and the former Soviet Union)." The revised document designates a new segment for the Amateur-Satellite Service from 144.000 to 144.025 MHz.

As it states in its introduction, "The IARU Region 2 has established this band plan as the way to better organize the use of our bands efficiently. To the extent possible, this band plan is harmonized with those of the other regions. It is suggested that member-societies, in coordination with the authorities, incorporate it in their regulations and promote it widely with their radio amateur communities."

For the first time the band plan includes definitions "to organize the concepts used in the band plan, as well as the proposed use of spectrum for the bands between 6 meters and 1 millimeter," says IARU R2 News Editor Joaquín Solana, XE1R.

The new band plan references near space stations (NSS) in its definitions section. According to the band plan, "Equipment located in temporary Near Space Stations (such as those carried by highaltitude balloons) can transmit carefully on any frequency; exceptions are the segments with 'exclusive' usage where 'NSS' are not applied. NSS must follow the BW [bandwidth] and mode restrictions of the segment and observe carefully the usual occupation of the band on the related region to avoid harmful interference. For longer missions and NSS crossing international and regional boundaries, extra care must be observed in harmonization of different allocations."

EASTER ISLAND DXPEDITION SET

Members of the Uruguay DX Group will be on the air from Easter Island as XRØYY November 1-7. A seven-person team will operate from Hanga Roa, running three stations simultaneously on 1.8 through 50 MHz, CW, SSB and digital modes. QSL via EB7DX. Easter Island is number 107 on the ClubLog Most Wanted list. Operators include Jose, CEØHYO; Gustavo, CX2AM; Humberto, CX3AN; Gustavo, CX3CE; Mario, CX4CR; Gen, EA5HPX; Francisco, EA7FTR, and Carlos, LU2NI.



RSØISS Active on SSTV from International Space Station

mitry Pashkov, UB4UAD, reports that the Amateur Radio slow-scan television (SSTV) experiment onboard the International Space Station has been active for the past couple of days on 145.800 MHz FM, mainly while the ISS is above Moscow. UB4UAD says that on October 31, RSØISS will transmit SSTV images showing images from the life and work of the first cosmonaut, Yuri Gagarin.

Stations can view the SSTV pictures from the ISS by making a simple audio connection between the receiver output and the computer soundcard input and using one of the free SSTV programs, such as MMSSTV (for Windows systems) or the SSTV app (for Apple iOS devices). Details are on the AMSAT-UK website. (Failing a hard-wired connection, just holding a mi-



crophone connected to the PC soundcard in front of the receiver's speaker should provide sufficient audio to decode the SSTV signal.) SSTV images from the ISS typically are in Martin 1 format.

The ISS Fan Club website indicates when the ISS is within range. The Energia page has more information on the SSTV experiment, which is designated MAI-75. Visit the UB4UAD blog.
