Thanks to everyone who participated in the Skywarn Training in February. That is always an important training session for those interested in the emergency communications aspects of Amateur Radio.

The third Friday in March is Good Friday, so the March general meeting will be the second Friday, March 14th. For the March meeting, Gary Stebbins, KC9GGV, is going to present on PSK31. Gary is very active on the digital modes and has run our Field Day RTTY station the last couple of years. Gary will focus on operating PSK as well as the software that he is using. If we run out of time on the software package he is featuring, then he has agreed to come back later in the year for more detail on that part of the operation.

And remember that due to youth activities every Friday night at Good Shepherd UMC, all of the 2008 Fort Wayne Radio Club meetings will be held in the large "Big Three" rooms off the back hallway.

For April, Jim Pliett, K9OMA, will be presenting an ATV demonstration. People tend to forget that the Fort Wayne Radio Club also operates an ATV repeater with facilities located on the campus of IPFW. This is a great but currently under-utilized resource. We would love to get more people operating on ATV, so this is your opportunity to come out and find out what you need to get on ATV!

Since we brought up the subject of repeaters I would like to spend some additional time on this subject. The Fort Wayne Radio Club operates 5 repeaters in the Fort Wayne area. There are the 146.76 and 146.94 that people tend to use the most with the "94" including autopatch. Then there is the ATV repeater that I just mentioned, the 146.91 with Echolink connection, and the 444.875 on the 70 cm band. We have a lot of very good options available to us; however, five repeaters is a considerable expense with utilities and maintenance.

We have been fortunate with occasional special donations helping some; but, we need your help. If you are not currently a member please join the club to help support the many repeater options. If you are a member but know someone who is not, encourage them to join to help support the repeaters. If we do not get some additional support then later this year we may have to discuss options like reducing the power output or hours of operation on some of the repeaters. We really do not want to get to that point. If you have other ideas to help support the repeaters; please let one of the board members know. Thank you for your support.



My First DX QSO Carl Luetzelschwab K9LA

Ft Wayne DX Association

I grew up in south Hammond (northwest Indiana), and that's where

my Amateur Radio activities started in the fall of 1961 as a new Novice with the call WN9AVT. From my earlier SWLing days, I had a long wire running out the basement window, up the side of the house, and to the garage.

Although I received my Novice license in mid October 1961, it took me two weeks to log my first QSO. I was quite ignorant of impedance matching and the concept of SWR with my random length long wire in relation to transmitting. When I dipped the plate current of my DX-20 and then increased the loading, the plate current dipped even lower. That's not how it's supposed to work.

Due to the SWR problem, I must have been running extreme QRP in terms of radiated power. In spite of many CQs and answering CQs from others, I had to wait for a local to show up for my first QSO. That turned out to be John KN9HFE in the

old 80 m Novice band (3700-3750 KHz). He was at the Calumet campus of Purdue University using the club call sign W9AUB. It was his first QSO, too.

The Calumet campus was only a couple miles away, so that certainly wasn't a DX QSO even though the two-week effort made it seem like a great accomplishment. Two more weeks elapsed before my second QSO. It was with another local, Ray WN9AMX, again on 80 m. Making only two QSOs in a month didn't earn me the reputation of burning up the bands.

My knight in shining armor turned out to be another local. A couple days after working WN9AMX, I ran into Pete WN9BAB in the old 40 m Novice band (7150-7200 KHz). He also lived a couple miles away, but he had already worked a whole bunch of States - and he had received his Novice ticket after I did. After telling him my woes, he suggested putting up a 40 m dipole antenna. The next weekend we took down the long wire, and replaced it with a 40 m dipole. Wonder of wonders - the DX-20's plate current now dipped higher after increasing the loading - hey, that's how it's supposed to work. Now that I was radiating the full DX-20 output power, the QSOs came fast and furious (as fast and furious as allowed by my J-38 straight key). And that's when the concept of real DX (i.e., farther than I could ride my bike) started to creep in.

Working 1s, 2s, 3s, 4s, 5s, 8s, and 0s became commonplace. My concept of DX was now 6s and 7s and stations outside the US. My first

outside-the-US QSO was with VO1FK in Newfoundland on 15 m in late January 1962. I was still a Novice at the time, and it was a Thursday afternoon around 2:30 PM (I don't know why I wasn't in school - maybe we had a

snow day). I waited very patiently for VO1FK's QSL, and sure enough it showed up in the mail a couple weeks later.

Working 6s and 7s followed, much to my delight, but the thrill of working VO1FK always overshadowed QSOs with the western States. And it still overshadows most of my current day DXing efforts. Working Canada and many of the other countries in the world is now pretty much routine (even around solar minimum!), but the thrill of that 1,700 mile QSO when I was WN9AVT with my DX-20 and NC-60 to a very low dipole will never fade from my memory.

Tennessee Agency Calls Army MARS Into Action



from *The ARRL Letter* – The Tennessee Emergency Management Agency (TEMA) called Army Military Affiliate Radio System (MARS) into action as tornados swept across the Southeastern United States February 5-6. According to Army MARS Chief Stuart Carter, "For the first time as far back as we can remember, a state government called for

MARS deployment in response to an actual emergency. The resulting teamwork and use of Army MARS Winlink capability gave TEMA its only e-mail link during President Bush's visit to the storm-stricken area." At least 70 messages were sent during the state operation ranging from casualty figure updates and signal reports to staff rosters and photos.

TEMA's Chief of Communications David Wolfe, WA4VVX (MARS call sign AAR4CY), said, "Although there was no commercial power at the deployment site, TEMA's communications infrastructure was fully operational. Both the VHF high band and 800 MHz repeater systems had good coverage for voice command and control. Our shortage was Internet connectivity, and our unmet needs were e-mail and the ability to send pictures. MARS Winlink provided exactly what was not available by any other means."

Carter said that this event illustrates the importance of detailed preparation and training that has taken place during realistic disaster response exercises over the past several years. "In the case of Tennessee, the story goes back a year and a half. Steve Waterman, K4CJX (MARS call sign AAA9AC) began working with Wolfe in late 2006, preparing for just such a deployment. At the time, Army MARS was just beginning to adopt the Winlink 2000 radio e-mail network system, and with the assistance of the then-Tennessee State Director Paul Drothler, WO4U (MARS call sign AAV4DJ), Army MARS had just signed a Memorandum of Understanding with TEMA. This MOU just served to strengthen an already strong relationship between TEMA and Army MARS. Wolfe led TEMA staffers who were already hams to becoming MARS members and to become qualified MARS Winlink 2000 operators. The rest of Wolfe's team soon obtained their Amateur Radio and Army MARS licenses."


The next step, according to Carter, was joint training for TEMA staff and Tennessee Army MARS members. Some was classroom training followed up with extensive field training. The culmination of the field training was TNCAT07, a massive exercise that included the Cen-

tral United States Earthquake Consortium (CUSEC), an eight-state alert consortium along the New Madrid fault line. This exercise also included the participation by ARRL Amateur Emergency Radio Service (ARES), Civil Air Patrol and other EmComm services that clearly demonstrated interoperability between TEMA, Tennessee Army MARS, the Amateur Radio community and other municipal communications services.

"To make a long story short," Carter said, "we now have seen a demonstration of seamless collaboration between Army MARS and one of our supported agencies under 'Real World' emergency conditions. This was the first Army MARS deployment since the Katrina/Rita disasters two years ago. Successfully meeting the challenge involved deployment readiness on the part of our members, and it required total Winlink 2000 mobility. First of all came the building of relationships with existing and potential customers, and then came meticulous training of state and federal staffers, and frequent exercising at home and in the field. With this pattern of established collaboration between our customers and MARS members, we enter the new era of Army MARS Emergency communications support."

500 kHz Distance Record Broken Again

from *The ARRL Letter* – On February 21, Neil Schwanitz, V73NS/WD8CRT, on Roi-Namur in the Marshall Islands, received a signal from experimental station WD2XSH/6. This experimental



station, operated by Pat Hamel, W5THT, is located in Long Beach, Mississippi -- 6679 miles away from the island in the Kwajalein atoll. This contact breaks the previous record for the longest 500 kHz contact. That record, set in January 2008, was for a distance of 4737 miles from Cottage Grove, Oregon to Roi-Namur. An article on Hamel's station appears in the March issue of QST. The ARRL 500 kHz experimental license, WD2XSH, was issued in September 2006 and has 20 active stations.
