

With the weather comes Amateur Radio fun too! We have the first contest participation on Saturday, May the 5th, which is the Indiana QSO Party. Thanks to the IPFW Radio Club and KC9UHU, we will have the grounds surrounding the Dolnick Learning Center at the far North East corner of the Indiana-Purdue-IVY tech campus in Fort Wayne, just across St Joe Road from the Canterbury Green complex. The current plan is for us to meet at the Center on Saturday at 8:30 to 9:00 am to begin setup. ## FORT WAYNE RADIO CLUB MEETING MINUTES

The April Meeting of the Fort Wayne Radio Club was held at the Good Shepherd United Methodist Church on 20 April 2012 with club president Steve Nardin, W9SAN, serving as host. There were about 30 persons present.

## **Old Business:**

Steve started the meeting with the pledge of allegiance and followed this by having all in attendance introduce themselves and their calls.

There was no Treasurer's report.

Minutes from the March meeting, and the April Foxhunt Chronicles, may be found on the club web page and in the Allen County Ham News.

#### **New Business:**

Steve Nardin reported that a new antenna has been installed at the top of the tower on Kettler Hall at IPFW for the 146.91 repeater. Everyone should notice the substantially improved footprint for this machine now. He also noted that the duplexer needs some work on it to further improve the machine's performance. When the duplexer repair is accomplished it will likely take the machine out of service for two to three days.

Along those lines, Larry Teminoff noted that Echolink activity, and participation in the 160 meter / 146.91 MHz cross band net had picked up considerably because of the improved footprint of the 146.91 machine.

Steve also reported that the frequency error on the 146.94 machine had been eliminated. It required replacement of the transmit L.O. ICOM.

Steve noted that the upgrades to the new club trailer were progressing nicely. Racks for internal storage of the tower sections had been installed as had storage tables. An interior DC lighting system already exists, so what remains to be in-

stalled is the interior AC lighting system.

Steve reported that plans to participate in the Coliseum Food Court funds raising activity have been shelved indefinitely because of the insurance coverage requirements that participation would impose upon the club.

Plans to participate in the Applebee's "Dining to Donate" 15% coupon promotion offer have solidified. Anyone who has dinner at the Applebee's at 5415 Meijer Dr. on 1 May, and who provides the server a 15% Coupon (that is available at no cost from Steve Nardin) will have 15% of their dinner bill donated to the club. In support of this the May Board of Directors meeting will take place at that Applebee's that evening starting at 7:00 pm.

Steve noted that Over-The-Air planning meetings for the VHF QSO Party, and for Field Day, will commence soon.

Steve reported that the Spring Banquet will occur on 11 May this year, one week earlier than usual because of the date of the Dayton Hamfest.

Following the business meeting the 50-50 raffle was conducted. Rich Meyer, K9DMA was the winner of one half of the \$29.00 pot which he graciously donated to the club treasury.

After the raffle Steve Nardin provided a very entertaining and educational presentation on Stealth Antennas. It was so well done that the club's resident antenna guru, Adolph Wozniak, WA9WTJ awarded Steve an "A+" for the presentation.



# Annual Armed Forces Day Crossband Test Scheduled For May 12

The Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps and Coast Guard are co-sponsoring the annual Military/Amateur Radio Crossband Communications Test in celebration of the 62nd anniversary of Armed Forces Day (AFD). Although the actual Armed Forces Day is celebrated on the third Saturday in May -- May 19 in 2012 -- the AFD Military/Amateur Crossband Communications Test will be conducted on May 12 to prevent conflict with the Dayton Hamvention®, scheduled for May 18-20.

The annual celebration features traditional military-to-amateur crossband communications SSB voice and Morse code tests. These tests give Amateur Radio operators and short wave listeners an opportunity to demonstrate their individual technical skills and to receive recognition from the appropriate military radio station for their proven expertise. QSL cards will be provided to those stations making contact with the military stations.

Military-to-amateur crossband operations will take place on the dates and time in UTC on the frequencies listed for each station. Voice contacts will include operations in single sideband voice (SSB). Some stations, depending on propagation and staffing, may not operate the entire period. Participating military stations will transmit on selected military MARS frequencies and listen for Amateur Radio stations in the amateur bands. The military station operator will announce the specific amateur band frequency being monitored. Duration of each voice contact should be limited to 1-2 minutes. The Secretary of Defense message will be transmitted via digital modes, inclusing RTTY, PACTOR, AMTOR, PSK-31, MFSK and MT63 from certain stations.

There were over 600 attendees at the DX Convention, of which about 35 were from outside North America. I also had the pleasure of finally meeting Bob W7LR in person – he sent me

much of his propagation collection since he was getting up in years. Another highlight of the Convention was introducing Bob KK6EK (research physicist and DXpeditioner to Peter I Island, Heard Island, San Felix Island, and other places) to Mark W9OP (we have dinner with Mark and the Milwaukee DX group every year at W9DXCC). 

# THE FOXHUNT CHRONICLES FOR APRIL 2012

The third foxhunt of the 2012 season occurred on Sunday the first of April, and the weather was simply spring gorgeous beautiful. The April Fool's Day hunters included the team of Linda and Steve Nardin, W9's LAN and SAN, the team of Kim and Jim Machamer, KB9's DOT and DOS, the team of Jim and Annie Pliett, K9OMA and KA9YYI, plus Al Burke, WB9SSE, the team of Brian and Debbie Jenks, W9BGJ and KB9ZQG, the team of Charles Ward and Fred Gengnagle, KC-9MUT and KC9EZP, and lone hunter Bob Dean, KC9UHU.

Dave Spence, KB9VTK plus Mark Berke, WA7NXI and his son Nathan served as the fox for this endeavor. They were located at a baseball diamond complex northeast of the Hodell Acres YMCA, just south of the south most end of Mason Drive.

The fox itself, according to Dave, was an H/T outfitted with a PIC driven keyer that automatically enabled the push-totalk of the unit every five minutes and provided Morse code tone keying to the audio input of the H/T. The Morse code in turn identified the unit as the fox and gave its call sign. The H/T, keyer unit and battery were packaged into an ammo box which was located by the side of the baseball complex access road, and was covered by a pile of sod left over from a recent upgrade to the baseball diamonds. However, the fox's antenna, a J-Pole, was located inside a metal culvert that ran under the access road to the baseball complex. The J-Pole was effectively in the middle of the road, but underneath it in the culvert. It proved to provide some interesting effects.

To start the hunt Dave and Mark used a cubical quad driven at about 100 watts. That was heard from the get-go by the hunting crew located at the parking lot of the Off-track Betting Parlor up on Lima and Washington Center Roads. Given that the initial bearings indicated the fox was south, everyone took off in earnest muttering "Thank God, it's not in New Haven".

The Pliett/Burke team, in its first attempt, made use of the Navi 2020 vector plotting program that allows you to draw (bearing) vectors from your GPS determined location onto a Google Earth map we had on a laptop in Jim's van. We use a flux-gate compass located atop Jim's van mounted yagi to give us true bearing indication. So all we have to do is take a bearing on the fox and input the true bearing reading into the Navi 2020 program and it plots a bearing vector from our GPS determined location right on the Google Map image. As it turned out, most all of the bearing lines we recorded were more or less parallel since we tended to head directly towards the fox's location. Taking bearings after running out some distance orthogonal to the initial bearing lines would probably help in the triangulation process, but it adds extra miles (and time) to your travel which works against you in the foxhunt scoring process. So the benefit of using the Navi 2020 program is at present undecided in my opinion.

Needless to say, following the readings from repeated bearings taken on the fox signal led us to Elmhurst High School. We noticed a very strong third harmonic signal, stronger than the fundamental! Normally when you detect the third harmonic it indicates you have localized the fox and it's time to get out and track the varmint on foot using your third harmonic gear. But since the third harmonic signal level was greater than the fundamental signal level, we concluded something was not quite right. In the Elmhurst High School

parking lot we took fox signal bearings towards the east and we noticed a very small green patch to the east on our GPS map indicating some type of "park". So we headed towards the "green patch" and found the baseball complex, and then Dave and Mark's vehicles. Since we had localized the fox we got our third harmonic gear out and again found that the third harmonic was very strong. In fact, it was so strong that my third harmonic gear (yagi, attenuator and uhf receiver) turned out to be useless. I cranked 90 db into the attenuator and could not get the receiver S-meter off full scale, and likewise could not when I disconnected the attenuator and yagi from the uhf receiver. Evidently we were standing directly over the fox's J-pole located beneath us in the culvert under the access road. Fortunately Annie noticed a suspicious looking pile of turf at the side of the road and she started sifting through it. Of course she quickly found the fox which made our team the first to find it sixty four minutes into the hunt.
