EchoLink Commands:

ON THE 146.91 REPEATER, FORT WAYNE RADIO **CLUB**

All commands, except disconnect, begin with an A. Therefore, you need a DTMF pad that has the extra four alpha codes, A, B, C, D.

- To cause the link to ID itself, punch A* You should hear it come back with "KB9RLW Link."
- To connect to a node, Dial 'A' plus the node number. Example: Carl's link down in Florida is number 47325, So you punch A47325 to connect.
- To connect to a randomly chosen node, Punch A1
- To connect to a randomly chosen conference, Punch A2
- To hangup or disconnect the current link, simply punch
- One additional handy command is A09. This will reconnect the last node we were connected to.

Band conditions again were not the best (that low end of the sunspot cycle thing) but contacts were plentiful. On 40 meters for most of the weekend you could hear 2-3 stations everywhere

on the band.

The club operated class 5A again this year with 2 phone stations, 1 RTTY station operated by Gary Stebbins, KC9GGV, the UHF/VHF station, and 1 CW station. In addition we also operated a GOTA station. At press time, I have not received any word on our scores but I think everyone involved had a great time.



Fort Wayne Radio Club Minutes June 16 2006



The June 2006 meeting of the Fort Wayne Radio Club was held at the Good Shepherd United Methodist Church on 16 June 2006 with President Jim Moehring as the host. There were about 25 persons present.

OLD BUSINESS:

There were no May minutes as May's event was the Spring Banquet and didn't include a business meeting.

Bob Streeter gave the Treasurer's report as follows: As of 16 June 2006 the club had realized year to date income of \$1,36.71 and expenses of \$715.35, and had no outstanding liabilities. It had \$127.00 in cash, and \$5,125.02 in Checking/Savings.

Steve Nardin and Al Burke provided status on the Echo-Link initiative. Steve, Al and Jim Pliett had installed the control link receiver at the repeater site and interfaced it with the 146.91/.31 MHz controller. Jim and Al acquired an eight-element UHF yagi at Dayton, and Kevin, KB9RLW, has installed it at the Echo-Link node at his QTH. The control link signal from Kevin's QTH to the repeater site was measured and it shows about a 15db margin above threshold, not great, but it should suffice until we have an opportunity to get the control link receiver antenna higher up on the repeater site tower. It appears that we may need to modify the de-emphasis (low-pass) filtering in the 146.31 MHz receiver to allow it to better pass DTMF tones. Plans are afoot to put the details of how to access, use, etc. the Echo-Link capability on the club web site.

NEW BUSINESS:

Jim Moehring noted that the FWRC Member's Handbook has been converted to .pdf format and will soon be placed on the club web site.

Jim Moehring discussed the status of the Emergency Communications planning effort that has been ongoing for about 3 months, and that is still a work in progress. Rich Andrew, N9HRA is heading up this initiative, and his committee has so-far concluded that when an emergency is declared, the EOC will use 146.76 MHz as the primary operating frequency and will use 146.94 MHz as a manpower check-in frequency with 146.91 MHz as an alternate.

Steve Nardin announced that the six meter net (holding forth on 50.58 MHz AM, vertical polarization) will be operating on the last Tuesday of each month starting at 8pm local.

The 50-50 Club raffle consisted of a pot totaling \$26.00, which was split between the club treasury and winner Richard, N9HRA.

Following the business meeting Jim Moehring and Steve Nardin lead a discussion addressing Field Day preparations. Jim noted that a QRP activity will occur at the Field Day site starting Friday evening and overnight for those interested. Field Day set up will commence at 8am Saturday morning with operations starting at 2pm and lasting through 2pm Sunday. Steve said we would be operating 5A with a GOTA station as well. Carole Burke announced that we would have a Hog Roast dinner at the Field Day site Saturday night starting at 5:30 pm. The roast consists of the usual roast hog with trimmings including sauer-kraut.



Summer DXing on 6 m Carl Luetzelschwab

By the time you read this, the summer Es (sporadic E)

season will be about two-thirds over. It's been a good season so far on 6m - the Midwest and East Coast have worked Europe and Africa, the Midwest has worked Japan, and the first-ever 6m QSOs between Alaska and Europe took place.

Why is Es so important for 6m? Simply put, it fills some of the void left by propagation via the F2 region. Since we're near solar minimum between Cycle 23 and Cycle 24 (the official solar minimum is expected to occur later this year or early next year), F2 propagation on 6m is highly unlikely now. In fact, 6m F2 propagation usually occurs only during the winter months around solar maximum - and that's several years behind us.

When is 6m Es likely to occur? With the help of a plot from the USAF Geophysics Handbook, we can pretty much pin it down. See the accompanying figure.


Although the data is from 1957 and 1958, it's still relevant and useful data. The horizontal axis is the month of the year for the two-year period of 1957 and 1958.

The vertical axis is local time at the path midpoint. The contours plotted are the percent probabilities for the number of days in the month that 6m Es should occur.

May, June, and July are the best months for 6m Es, with a small secondary peak in the month of December. During the month of July we can expect Es to occur from about 8AM to midnight. The highest probabilities (40% to 50% of the days) are centered around late morning (10AM to noon) and mid evening (7PM to 10PM). Although the probabilities decrease between these optimum times, they don't go to zero.

The fact that the probabilities are highest during two periods and non-zero in between opens up the opportunity for lost distance multi-hop Es. For example, when the Midwest is in the early evening hours and Japan is in the mid morning hours, the midpoints of the first Es hops on each end of the path would be in the early evening (Midwest end) and the late morning (Japan end). The midpoints of the middle hops wouldn't have as high probabilities, but it looks like their probabilities would be above 20% - apparently that was good enough for many Midwest-to-Japan 6m QSOs in June.

So fire up your 6m rig (which nowadays is probably your regular HF rig), and have some fun on what's known as the Magic Band.
