FORT WAYNE RADIO CLUB MEETING MINUTES

The June meeting of the Ft. Wayne Radio Club was held at the Good Shepherd United Methodist Church on 20 June, 2014, and was hosted by club president Steve Nardin, W9SAN. There were about 40 people in attendance for this meeting, and after reciting the Pledge of Allegiance, everyone present introduced themselves via their call-sign.

Tom Baker, W9TB announced the sale of Julian Franke, W9TQA's, ham radio items which would occur at his QTH this following Saturday, 21 June starting at 8am and ending at 5pm. Items include a 150' Pyrod self-supporting tower, three Telrex monoband Yagi's (10, 15 & 20 meters), Heathkit, Kenwood and home brew linear amplifiers, and numerous other ham radio items.

Tom also announced that there would be a VE test session conducted from 9am till 11am at the Field Day site on Saturday, 28 June.

Joseph Lawrence, KB9RFZ took a few minutes to thank everyone who voted for him in his successful bid for the ARRL Indiana Section Manager position. He took 58% of the vote.

Steve Nardin gave a synopsis of the FWRC participation in the VHF/UHF QSO Party the weekend of 14-15 June. The club put up a tower and yagis at the Regal-Beloit complex across the street from the former ITT site on Lima Rd. and operated on 50, 144 and 440 MHz. Propagation was lousy Saturday day, picked up a little during the evening, and again Sun-

day morning. Everyone had a good time and no one was injured during set-up and later tear-down, and the exercise gave us a chance to check out equipment we will use during Field Day. Photos can be found on the FWRC web site in the "photos" section under "VHF/UHF QSO Party, June 2014"

Steve announced that plans are coalescing for our Field Day outing on the weekend of 28-29 June at the Dolnick Center on the IPFW campus. An On-The-Air planning meeting is scheduled to occur Thursday evening, the 26th, to discuss details.

Linda Nardin, W9LAN stated that Field Day meal plans were complete. (This got everyone's attention as it addressed the subject of FOOD). Saturday evenings Field Day Hog Roast will feature Blue Stack Smokehouse Pulled Pork sandwiches, creamy cole slaw, baked beans, sauerkraut, fresh fruit with dip, carrot and chocolate cupcakes and drinks, plus what-ever goodies attendees bring in (and you are encouraged to do so). I just know someone out there will bring in some deviled eggs to help make the meal complete. Food will be served starting at 5:30 pm at the paltry cost of just \$7.00 per head.

Linda also announced that Sunday morning breakfast consisting of blueberry, chocolate and plain pancakes with regular and sugar-free syrup, and sausage links and patties plus regular and decaf coffee, milk, and lemonade would be served starting at 10:00am for a cost of \$3.00 per head.

Items from the estate of Dan Spencer, KF9LZ were brought to the meeting for pick-up by their new owners. About fifty items were involved. A few other items that had not been included in the original inventory, and were not a part of the online bidding process were auctioned off at the meeting. Al Burke, WB9SSE stated that he had received a response from the Indiana Repeater Council regarding our decision that the FWRC intended to use 97.4 Hz as the input access tone frequency for our 146.76, 146.910, 146.940 and 444.875 MHz machines. The IRC is happy with 97.4 Hz, so Al will prepare and submit the recoordination paperwork shortly.

Following the business meeting Charles Ward, KC9MUT and Bob Dean, KC9UHU gave a presentation and hardware/software demonstration of the Wi-Fi system they developed to connect station nodes for logging purposes at Field Day and other operating events. The system operates in the Amateur Radio segment of 2.4 GHz. A few photos captured during their presentation are included in the photos posted on the FWRC web site entitled "June 2014 FWRC meeting".

The meeting was called to order by Dave, W9LKH.



Low-Noise Receive Antennas

Man-made noise generally arrives from around the compass – especially if you're in a residential area. Atmospheric noise is more directional in nature as it is generated by lightning discharges in and around thunderstorms.



The concept behind lownoise receive antennas is antenna directivity – in other words, a pattern similar to our Yagis on the higher bands where one direction is favored and other directions are rejected. Beverages are a good example of low band




Figure 1. Noise at W4ZV.

A good example of the directional nature of atmospheric noise is Figure 1. It shows the result of an analysis on 1.8 MHz that started with worldwide lightning discharges and did ray traces to see how the electromagnetic energy propagated from all these discharges. The image is centered on W4ZV (North Carolina) at 1130 UTC in February. The strongest atmospheric noise comes in the from the east, and is due to thunderstorm activity in February in the Atlantic in a box roughly from 25 to 45 degrees North latitude and from 15 to 75 degrees West longitude.

antennas with directivity, along with loops and combinations of loops.

Two of our FWDXA members are not only topband enthusiasts, but they also make products to help receiving abilities on the low bands.

Jim KR9U makes the K9AY receiving loop antenna system (which consists of two K9AY loops perpendicular to each other). It is designed to work best on the lower frequencies (160 and 80 meters). The control box (Figure 2) controls a relay box that is mounted at the antenna, and you can select four directions with the two K9AY loops on a single support. If you aren't a 160 meter enthusiast, you can scale the antenna down in size for use on 80 and 40 meters. Jim sells the product to Array Solutions, who is the distributor. For more information, see Jim's website at http://wolfrfsystems.com.




Figure 3. Transformers for the KD9SV Two-Direction Beverage Kit

These products include (but are not limited to) preamplifiers, keying relays, front-end savers (disconnects the receive antenna from the receive input on your radio when transmitting), 9:1 matching transformers for single-wire Beverages and a two-direction Beverage kit (transformers shown in Figure 3). THE FOX HUNT CHRONICLES

June, ahh June, when graduations abound and summer vacations start and Foxhunters shuck their boots, caps, overcoats and sweat-shirts for breezier garb. And thus it was that the first hunt of the summer commenced on a beautiful first day of June with the foxhunt team of Charles Ward, KC9MUT and Fred Gengnagle, KC9EZP, the team of Steve and Linda Nardin, W9's SAN & LAN, the team of Kim & Jim Machamer, KB9's DOS & DOT, and the team of Bob Dean, KC9UHU & Dave Spence, K9NDU congregating at Buckner Park as the starting point.

The services of the fox were provided by Jim & Annie Pliett, K9OMA & KA9YYI plus Carole & Al Burke, WB9's RUS & SSE. Jim & Annie served as the high power fox and were ensconced in their van behind the McDonald's on Coliseum near Speedway Dr. while the low power fox was contained in Carole and Al's daughter's van located in the north parking lot of Glenbrook Square near the Barnes & Noble store. The high power fox emitted about 20 watts into Jim's roof mounted yagi, while the low power fox emitted about one watt using an HT. Both foxes used 146.280 MHz.

Taunting of the hunters started promptly at 13:30 and we believe was heard by all at Buckner Park. Around thirty minutes into the hunt we noticed that Kim & Jim were snooping around the McDonald's parking lot where Jim & Annie were located, and in fact found them a little bit after that. Then, forty six minutes into the hunt Bob & Dave drove right past our (low power fox) hide, smiled and waved to us. Thus, they were the first to physically find the fox. A little after that Charles and Fred parked on the north edge of Glenbrook's lot next to Coldwater, dismounted and started hunting on



foot, but they stayed on the north edge of the lot. Steve and Linda were driving and walking-hunting much closer to our Barnes & Noble location, and if fact Steve walked past our location, one

Bob Dean and Dave Spence were the winners of this one and thus will serve as the fox for the July hunt. The Public Safety Academy will serve as the starting point, using 146.430 MHz as the fox frequency.
