The "Tail Gate Hamfest" will be held August 17th, in the parking lot of the Good Shepherd United Methodist Church.

Speaking of the tailgate, the board has explored the possibility of having this event in the parking lot of Meisner Electronics. Because of the timing this year, we decided to maintain the church lot, however, next year we are seriously considering a move to the lot at Meisner's.

The other major issue facing the club is the repeater site on Leo road. There are a number of things related to the site that are of importance to the club. First of all, as you may have been aware, the PA's on the '76 and 444 repeaters failed at about the same time. The technical group quickly evaluated the problem and repaired the PA's. The

repeaters ran only on the exciters for a few days but are now back in normal operation. At about the same time it was noted that, once again, vandals had struck the shack and removed the grounding system from the outside of the shack. The board isn't sure if the two are related but we highly suspect that to be the case. We are currently attempting to fence in the shack and hopefully will be doing so before the snow flies. The AEP folks have been contacted for specifications and for permission to install the fence. Finally, we still have a fairly high power consumption at the site and unfortunately we have been forced to turn on the air conditioning in the shack. Hopefully we will be installing a more efficient air conditioner in the near future


That's about all the new for now. Keep cool and see you at the Tailgate!

Fort Wayne Radio Club Minutes 20 July 2007

The July 2007 meeting of the Fort Wayne Radio Club was held at the Good Shepherd United

Methodist Church on 20 July 2007 with Vice President Woody Woodbury serving as the host. There were about 20 persons present.

OLD BUSINESS:

Woody Woodbury started the meeting by calling all to attention for the pledge of allegiance.

The June minutes were read and there were no corrections.

Bob Streeter presented the June Treasurer's report. As of 20 July 2007 the club had realized a year-to-date income of \$2,089.04, & year-to-date expenses of \$1,665.74. The club had cash on hand of \$150.36 and had \$6,321.51 in checking/savings.

NEW BUSINESS:

Tom Baker summarized the results of the club's Field Day efforts. We ran as a 6A operation and are claiming a total of 4,698 points which is our best outing since 2002 and was up 1,100 points from last year effort. We had a record number of contacts on CW (692), 445 of them on 40 meters. 230 of our contacts were on phone. And for the first time in memory, brass from the Red Cross paid the site a visit and were given a cook's tour of the operation.

Tom noted that a VE testing session would occur the first Saturday in August at the Boy Scout office from 09:00 till noon.

Woody Woodbury noted that the August meeting will be our annual Tailgate Hamfest and will occur in the GSUMC parking lot.

Al Burke reported that all repeaters are functional. Maintenance had recently been required on the 146.76 MHz, 444.875 MHz and 146.94 MHz machines, all during the period of about one week (during the 4th of July holiday period). The 146.94 MHz machine (up at the Parkview site) needed a squelch adjustment and power to the controller recycled to get it percolating. Meanwhile, the power amplifiers in both the 146.76 MHz and 444.875 MHz machines (out at Robison Park) had failed and these systems were running on their exciters for about one week. Jim Pliett repaired

both of the power amplifiers and they were replaced a few days ago. So now both repeaters are again operating normally.

Chad Beach suggested the club consider offering autodial features (and perhaps reverse-autopatch features) for paid-up club members on the 146.94MHz machine. He noted that the 146.94 machines controller is capable of both functions and could accommodate up to 99 autodial numbers. Woody said the subject would be put on the agenda for discussion at the next Board of Directors meeting.

Following the business meeting the 50-50 raffle was held. The \$14.00 pot was split between the club treasury and Wilbur, KB9IQW.

The July presentation was provided by Chad Beach, W9GGA, who discussed the fine art of traffic handling.

the newsletter for details and a map. We did not have any meetings last month because of vacations and festivals and other activities.

In thinking what to write about, I decided to re-visit the past. In the early days of the Three Rivers Festival, the ham radio community was an active participant. The biggest event that we took part in was the opening day parade. We provided the communications between the staging area and the reviewing stand. Any changes in the line up was relayed to the stand so that the announcers would have the correct line up. That information was also given to WPTA 21 Alive for their broadcast. We also had hams along the route stationed on garden tractors. In the early days, the floats were towed by garden tractors. They had backup tractors along the route in case of a breakdown. We had a ham every few blocks to watch for breakdowns and any other problems such as a medical one.

One year I recall that it was only 8:00 AM, two hours before the start of the parade, and it was already over 90 degrees. Some of us also helped the Red Cross in those early years as they had one of their RV's there as a first aid station. We were there in case they would need to call an ambulance. We would use something called auto-patch. Remember what that is ?. Remember this was in the mid 80's, before there were cell phones. We also participated as an festival event. We set up a display about Ham Radio, and had a special event station. We let the public send messages from the festival, and we also had special event QSL cards made to send to stations that we made contact with. If I remember correctly, the display was called The Wonderful World of Ham Radio. We did get a lot of interest in the display, and some of the current hams got their first exposure to Ham Radio from this event, and became hams. Many of us have fond memories of those days. I hope a few of mine help you recall some of yours.

I need some suggestions for a program for September. If there is something that you would like to hear about, let me know. That is all for this month. See you at the picnic.

ARMAD will once again sponsor the 911 / Freedom-



A Quick Trip to ZF Carl Luetzelschwab K9LA

In conjunction with a family vacation to the Cayman Islands in mid July, Vicky and I joined Joe W6VNR/ZF2AH

in putting ZF1A on the air for the 2007 IARU HF Contest. We participated as the Cayman Amateur Radio Society (CARS) station. It had been quite a while since we last visited ZF (November 2001 to be exact), and we looked forward to seeing how the island (and the CARS shack and antennas on ZF1EJ's property) had recovered from Hurricane Ivan in 2004.

The re-built ZF1A shack is now approximately twice as big and is much quieter without the well pump in the operating room. A welcome addition when the shack was rebuilt was the addition of a bathroom in an adjoining room - that means no more late-night treks to another building to relieve oneself.

The antennas did not fare well with Ivan. The main 90 ft tower with the TH6 didn't survive (see the accompanying photos). The shorty-40 (a Cushcraft 40-2CD) on a 45 ft sailing mast didn't survive, either. The 60 ft HBX tower with a Mosley tribander came through ok, but it was replaced due to being in overall poor condition due to exposure to salt and humidity.

The new tower is impressive. It has a much wider base than the old 90 ft tower, it is 10ft higher, and it has a 17 element log periodic array (48 ft boom) covering 40-10 m. It really plays well.

Vicky and I arrived on noon on Friday before the contest. After checking into our hotel on Seven Mile Beach, we had a quick lunch, ran some errands in preparation for our family's arrival on Monday, visited John ZF1DJ, and then headed out to the ZF1A shack.

We met Joe W6VNR at the shack, and he had already set up the station (a TS-850 with an Alpha 78) and was playing around on 20 m. We chatted for a while, and declared that we were ready to go.

Although the contest started Saturday morning at 7 AM local time (1200 UTC), Vicky and I didn't get out to the shack until around 9:30 AM (we came down to ZF primarily for the family vacation, so radio was the second priority on the list). After visiting with ZF1EJ for a bit, we made our first contest QSO around 10 AM.

We started on 20 m, and spent most of the contest there. We did have a short QSY to 15 m before lunch, but QSOs were few and far between and we went back to 20 m after about 15 minutes. We broke for lunch just before noon (which we had at the hotel since we were on an all-inclusive package), and came back around 2:30 PM for more 20 m work. When we broke for dinner (we again ran back to the hotel), Joe took over and stayed on 20 m until Vicky and I arrived back at the shack. Around 10 PM we QSY'd to 40 m, and stayed there until we called it quits for the contest about an hour later (the contest didn't end until Sunday morning at 7 AM, but we had no desire to operate through the night).

Vicky ended up doing most of the operating, as she always attracted a bigger crowd than me (I wonder if wearing tighter underwear would help me?). We didn't set any records, but Vicky, Joe, and I had fun handing out the CARS multiplier.

We did make it back to the shack Sunday evening, and Vicky got on the 3905 Century Club nets (40 m and 80 m), and handed out many YL ZF contacts (she was a regular on this net when she was going for her 5BWAS, and she was even the 40 m net control station on a regular basis).

Look for an article in the September issue of QST about the amateur radio support for the Indiana State Ardent Sentry exercise that was centered in Marion County.

On June 19th, the U.S. Coast Guard held a simulated earthquake that affected 13 states. Vanderburgh County was the center of the command and control. ARES and RACES memers provided communications for the first two hours since all cell phones and public service radios were "off the air". This exercise was extensive. Amateur radio operators were assigned to the Area Command, the Coast Guard, and Marathon Oil. Other amateurs were assigned to hospitals, police, Health Department, the Marathon storage area along the Ohio River, and the EMA EOC. A total of 35 messages were passed using VHF simplex, packet, and HF to the State EOC. (fm WB9EFH)

The Indiana Radio Club Council (IRCC) is now taking nominations for the 2007 Outstanding Amateur of the Year Award. Each year, one Hoosier Amateur Radio operator is selected to receive the award for outstanding service and dedication to Amateur Radio. The award will be presented during the Fort Wayne Hamfest/Indiana ARRL Convention in November. Nominees will be judged on years in Amateur Radio, years in a service role, active in public service, and active as a mentor to new hams. Also considered is participation as a ham radio instructor, volunteer examiner, and whether this person actively recruits new hams, especially young people. This is a basic criteria and your application should not be limited to just these areas. The more information, the better. Please include your nominees email address or telephone number for the follow-up notification. Nominations are due by midnight September 31, 2007. Jack Parker W8ISH, Chairman IRCC.

Contesting Software - Gary Stebbins

During Field Day several times it was mentioned to me that there is in an interest in being able to network computers during the contest.

I have been using N1MM Logger for about 18 months. It requires a Windows based PC with Win 98 or newer and at least a Pentium III 700 MHz and a minimum of 128 MB of RAM. The desktop PC I used last year for FD was 700 MHz P III with 384 MB of RAM and Windows 2000 OS. It worked fine. This year most of you saw the new laptop I was using running XP.

I have been reading some reviews on Eham concerning logging and contesting programs http://www.eham.net/reviews/products/27

Another program that looks promising is called Win Test. But it is not FREE. One contesting club in Virginia has used TR LOG, N1MM and others and switched to Win Test and said it was great. Better than the ones they had used before. Win Test was written in Europe. http://www.win-test.com/rubrique.php3?id_rubrique=1300

As I mentioned above I have been using N1MM Logger for Phone, PSK and RTTY contesting and it seems to work well. I have not attempted to use multiple PC's yet with it.

Please keep in mind with N1MM you can use Ethernet connections between each of the PC's but each computer will maintain it own copy of the log database.

Now, someone also mentioned going wireless. I am not sure that would be a good idea in an RF intense environment such as a contest. Carl, K9LA does not believe it would be a good idea either due to the amount of RF (I think he would know since he is a contester and an RF engineer). Also most wireless routers (even 802 N) are slower than a direct connection over CAT 5. We would need one hub (10/100) with 8 ports to connect 8 PC's together. N1MM will support up to 16 PC's on a network. Only the master computer would need to connect to the DX Cluster for DX Spots via a TNC. The others would use Telnet to receive (i.e. mirror the master).

2-element cubical quad; reflector loops behind the driven loops. I added 10-meter loops, so it is now for 20/15/10 meter bands. A very-well-made welded aluminum-alloy "spider" or "hub" supports the 8 fiberglass spreader arms. Loops are regular 14-gauge copper antenna wire. Nylon cords are tied between the outer ends of "driven" and "reflector" spreaders for stabilizing. Mounted on a 30-ft. tower, hinged at bottom and anchored to the house at eave. Home-brew rotator at bottom of tower - motor and gearbox (I think from a roto-tiller). Rotator is relay-controlled, with selsyn direction indicator at the remote control box. Relay switching of the 3 driven loops into one feedline - switch included in the rotator control box.

Fiberglass spreaders have survived wind and ice storms during almost 30 years.

Whoever wants this antenna may have it for taking it down and hauling it away. I will help with getting it down, disassembling, and getting you all the hardware, control box, feedline, control cable, etc. - even the block-and-tackle that I use for raising and lowering the tower.

I will be glad for someone to get some use out of this antenna. If someone in your club is interested, please let me know.
